As many of you are aware, an idea was born in the discernment meetings held by this congregation in recent months. Some people raised the possibility of hiring a seminary graduate who has not yet received a call from a congregation. Quite a few people have made pledges for extra mile gifts in order to make this a reality. The executive team has interviewed student they believe will have gifts to share with our congregation, especially in the area of Evangelism. She will serve with us part time: two full days each week and Sunday mornings.

Her name is Meheret Caruthers. She has studied theology in her home country of Ethiopia, in Norway, and now for several years at the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Gettysburg. Last year, she worked with a neighboring Lutheran Church, St. John's Lutheran Church in Pimlico, where she learned strong lessons in Evangelism.

She begins work here in late August to be ready for the beginning of many church programs in September. She will be with us Sunday mornings and will assist in leading worship. We do not know how long she will be with us, because when she receives a call from a congregation we will release her from her work here. Please pray for Meheret as she begins her work

CONGREGATIONAL PICNIC

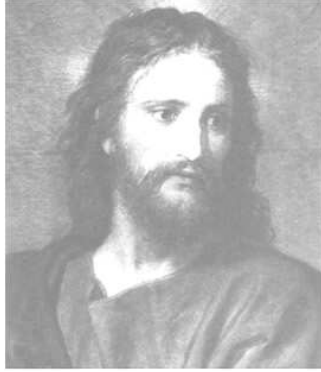
September 25

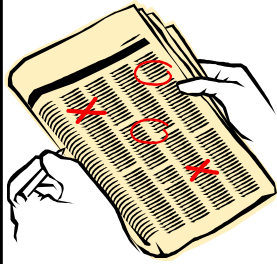
Sept 18 – Ms. Jennie Heinbaugh, Principal of Barclay School

PRINCIPLES FOR CHRISTIAN LIVING

As baptized members of the Body of Christ, we confess Jesus as our Lord and Savior. We proclaim the Gospel as the Word of God. Inside of this proclamation we are called to appreciate the gifts that God has given us through grace and accept our role as stewards. The following principles provide a foundation for a life as faithful and generous Christians.

- 1. A grateful Christian** is our response to what God has given to us—the gift of Jesus Christ & the community of believers. We recognize that God comes first.
“...but first they gave themselves to the Lord”
11 Corinthians 8:5
- 2. A responsible Christian** is our way of acknowledging and showing faith in the Gospel.
“you will glorify God by your obedience in acknowledging the Gospel of Christ”
11 Corinthians 9:13
- 3. A self-sacrificing Christian** reflects the self-sacrifice of Christ. For our sake Jesus gave up everything to make us rich through the cross & the resurrection. We too are called to sacrifice so others may share in God’s Word and blessings.
“...gave according to their means, and even beyond their means.”
11 Corinthians 8:3
- 4. A willing Christian** means each person is moved by the Holy Spirit to give of himself or herself. We are to freely give our time, talents & resources.
Paul writes of the Macedonians:
“For, as I can testify, they voluntarily gave...”
11 Corinthians 8:3
- 5. A sharing Christian** recognizes the unique gifts each person has received & that these gifts are intended for the good of the community of God. We are to use our gifts for the benefit of all.
“And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work.”
11 Corinthians 9:8
- 6. A proportionate Christian** refers to giving in relation to our abundance. We are to give according to our “means,” not according to our income or budget.
“If the readiness is there, it is acceptable according to what a person has, not according to what he has not.”
11 Corinthians 8:12
- 7. A committed Christian** means making a statement about your intent and following through. As members in the Body of Christ, we are asked to make a commitment of our time, talents and resources as a faithful response to God and as a statement of support for God’s work.
Paul encourages us to:
“...arrange in advance for the gift you have promised.”
11 Corinthians 9:5
- 8. A regular Christian** means practicing our stewardship on a daily basis, making it our lifestyle.
“On the first day of the week, let each one lay aside their offering, as God has prospered them.”
11 Corinthians 16:2
- 9. A genuine Christian** means putting your faith into action—the tangible demonstration of what is sincerely on our hearts and where our treasure is, not simply a verbal expression. The Macedonians set an example that Paul called to the attention of the Corinthians:
“...to prove by the earnestness of others that your love is also genuine.”
11 Corinthians 8:8
- 10. A challenged Christian** recognizes the dynamic nature of our faith. As our faith grows so will our blessings, and our responsibilities.
“...the one who sows sparingly will reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully.”
11 Corinthians 9:6

**A NEW BUDGET PROCESS
AND REVISED CONGREGATIONAL
MEETING SCHEDULE**

At its last meeting, the Church Council adopted a new procedure for creating next year's budget. Leaders of Mission Teams and other Parish Leaders will join the council on Sept 27 as the leaders create three sets of priorities for our ministries here.

First, we will agree upon what we have to do in order to be the church in this place. This category will include any legal obligations the church must pay, and what is most central to our reason for being.

Second, we will agree upon what we ought to do in order to do our ministry in the way we believe God calls us to do it.

Third, we will agree upon what we would like to do if there are sufficient funds to pay for it.

After leaders create these priorities, then the finance team must take those priorities and use them for funding decisions, basing the over all total of 2012 receipts on past years' practice and pledges to the church.

12th Churchwide Assembly - Summary of Actions

Twelfth Churchwide Assembly • Aug. 15-19, 2011 • Orlando, Fla.

The 12th Biennial Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America was held Aug. 15-19, 2011, at the Marriott World Center in Orlando, Fla. The assembly included 1,025 voting members. The theme was "Freed in Christ to Serve."

ELCA Malaria Campaign officially launched

The assembly officially launched the ELCA Malaria Campaign under the auspices of ELCA World Hunger. Along with our full communion partners, ELCA members will join with Lutheran churches in Africa to work toward a malaria-free future. A goal of the campaign is to raise \$15 million over a four-year period. The assembly acknowledged that gifts to the ELCA Malaria Campaign are not intended to replace gifts to ELCA World Hunger.

"Genetics, Faith and Responsibility" social statement adopted

The assembly adopted "Genetics, Faith and Responsibility," a social statement on genetics. The statement, described as the first by a North American church, develops a comprehensive ethical framework for addressing advancements in medical and agricultural research. It is the 11th social statement of the ELCA.

Review process for social statements adopted

The assembly called for a review process of current procedures for the development and adoption of social statements. No new social statements will be considered until a review process has been completed and shared with the ELCA Church Council in the fall of 2012, followed by a report to the 2013 Churchwide Assembly. During this time, the process for developing the criminal justice social statement and the justice for woman social statement will continue.

Living into the Future Together implementing resolutions adopted

There were resolutions put forth by the ELCA Church Council and the Living into the Future task force, designed to set a course for the ELCA's future and to consider this church's structure and relationships.

- ◆ Churchwide Assemblies will transition from a biennial to a triennial cycle, starting after the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.
- ◆ The assembly also approved recommendations that focus on strengthening connections within and across the expressions and partner ministries of this church.
- ◆ Voting members of the ELCA Church Council shall include the four churchwide officers and the chair of the ELCA Conference of Bishops. Thirty-three members will continue to be nominated by their synods; the council may not exceed 45 members. Additional members may be nominated by the Church Council to ensure diversity and expertise. All will continue to be elected by the Churchwide Assembly.
- ◆ The Congregational and Synodical Mission unit of the churchwide organization will review a recommendation for ministry with mentally and physically "handicapped" children and adults.

Church wide Assembly - Summary of Actions

Continued...

- ◆ The assembly invited members of the ELCA to initiate collaborative work by congregations, synods, the church wide organization, institutions of the church and others to create and support diverse non-legislative forums and events that bring together leaders of this church to participate in theological study and reflection, foster leadership development and enhance the interdependence of this church.
- ◆ The assembly provided a means to continue the work assigned to the Living into the Future Together task force in collaboration with the Church Council and the Conference of Bishops.

ELCA budget proposals adopted

The assembly approved a 2012 current fund spending authorization of \$61,792,900, and approved a 2012 ELCA World Hunger income proposal of \$18,500,000. This vote included approving a 2013 current fund income proposal of \$61,939,400, a 2013 ELCA World Hunger income proposal of \$18,500,000, and authorizing the Church Council to establish a spending authorization after periodic review of revised income estimates.

Memorials adopted

1. The assembly adopted a variety of resolutions to expand multicultural ministry, acknowledge the International Year for People of African Descent and work to prevent bullying, harassment and related violence.
2. The assembly supported immigration reform and the DREAM (Development, Relief and Education for Alien Minors) Act, which would provide a path for citizenship for undocumented high school graduates.
3. The assembly received memorials related to investment for positive change in Palestine, and encouraged members, congregations, synods and agencies of this church to achieve a deeper understanding of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.
4. The assembly also recognized and celebrated Lutheran Campus Ministry and the central role of farmers and ranchers in providing an abundant supply of food and fiber for our nation and the world.
5. The assembly declined to change governing documents that would increase the number of voting members to Synod Assemblies and Church wide Assemblies who are layperson.

Constitutional amendments adopted

The assembly moved to change ELCA governing documents related to Living into the Future Together, the redesign of the church wide organization and other matters.
